An Ordinary Reflection...



Sitting with l God's

These next few weeks, many are busy getting ready the costumes children want to wear for Halloween. Once costumed, we bring them to the

loved ones we know who will be happy to see them. A few weeks ago in St. Mark's Gospel, Jesus was "indignant" with his disciples because they "rebuked" the children that were being brought to him. This Sunday, ten of the twelve become "indignant" with James and John because they asked Jesus "that in your glory we may sit one at your right and the other at your left." Sounds pretty gutsy for James and John. Maybe this is why in Mark's Gospel, he costumes them with the name "the sons of thunder." They certainly created quite a rumble of outrage and jealousy among their companions!

In our world, it doesn't take much to get filled with indignation. It usually depends on which costume we are being forced to wear – elderly, immigrants, teens, religious people, members of a particular political party, union workers, marginalized, homeless, billionaires, and on and on. This Sunday's Scriptures - Isaiah, Hebrews and Mark, invite us to step out of these categories, whether we chose them or were given them, and search deeper. The Prophet Isaiah wants us to discover "the light in fullness." The writer of Hebrews urges us to "confidently approach the throne of grace." Finally, even though James and John create quite a mess by their selfish inquiry, they are aware that the Teacher Jesus is bidding all of us to enter into God's glory.

Where they, and ourselves, got confused and misguided is in seeing this "glory" as something that allows us to "lord it over" others, or let it become a way we "make our authority felt over" someone else. Quite the opposite, our oneness with glory of God occurs when we recognize in the midst of our infirmity or suffering, our weakness or testing, our feeling like a slave or servant, that the trustworthy God of kindness is right beside us.

Jesus, the child of all humanity, whom we need to welcome into our lives continuously, chose to experience all of our afflictions without sin. The cross was where he was baptized and found his glory. Understanding our struggles, enabled Jesus to walk with us on our timely paths to grace. He never expects us to live in quilt or shame, but to let God's mercy set us free. Once free, Jesus' hope is that we become great and first in caring for all our sisters and brothers, no

matter what costume we in our worldliness falsely assign them. As the Psalm tell us, "The eyes of the Lord are upon us." Unlike the eyes of our Halloween characters, these eyes are not meant to scare us. They are shining upon us to bring us hope. The hope that keeps us from looking for the wrong signs of glory like James and John. But rather, it allows us to drink with Jesus from the cup of other peoples' crosses. It is then that we are truly prepared by God alone to sit not on the right or left, but with all of God's children.

WORSHIP: How a parish animates the spiritual life of its mission.

<u>Goal I:</u> We will continue to highlight our mass celebrations in ways which respond to the needs of the parish family to lead us to a stronger appreciation of the Eucharist.

- 1. To have the Director of Music and Liturgical Ministries with interested parishioners reestablish the praying of the Rosary before masses during October 2024 to be led by parishioners.
- 2. To have the Pastor and Director of Music and Liturgical Ministries coordinate and evaluate the plan for offering of an evening weekday mass once a week

Goal II: We will bring people together for prayer and worship as one united parish.

- 1. To have the Director of Music and Liturgical Ministries, Pastor and a team of liturgical ministers in 2024-2025 develop an educational/liturgical gathering for a greater appreciation of our Church and how worship is enriched by this understanding.
- 2. To have Pastor, Deacon and Director of Music and Liturgical Ministries assess future direction to enhance Eucharistic Adoration in the Parish
- 3. To have the Ministry Team continue to offer Special Liturgies Memorial Day, Anointing of the Sick, Liturgy on All Souls for families, etc. and regularly assess the options and need for any other liturgical gatherings
- 4. To have the Ministry Team continue the offering of the Sacraments and visits to Homebound, First Friday Calls, Anointing of the Sick, and to regularly assess other ways to respond to our homebound and parishioners

Goal III: We will create prayer and worship gatherings which include other faith communities.

- 1. To have Pastor and Ministry Team assess with other pastors and parishes how to share together some of our liturgical endeavors, e.g. Eucharistic Adoration, Road to Resurrection Masses, Divine Mercy Sunday, etc.
- 2. To have the Ministry Team continue to offer Sacraments and liturgies for people at Crossin Towers, Wesley Village, Hospitals and Hospices, and regularly assess other ways to respond to our senior citizens

PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATE COMPARISON

Vice President KAMALA HARRIS Former President DONALD TRUMP



ABORTION

In a 2023 interview, Harris said, "We need to put into law the protections of Roe v. Wade, And that is about going back to where we were before the <u>Dobbs decision</u>." <u>Harris posted</u> on social media in July 2024, "We who believe in reproductive freedom will stop Donald Trump's extreme abortion bans—because we trust women to make decisions about their bodies." In her address at the Democratic National Convention Harris said, "[W]hen Congress passes a bill to restore reproductive freedom, as president of the United States, I will proudly sign it into law."

As president, <u>Trump</u> nominated three Supreme Court justices who voted to overturn Roe v Wade. In an April 2024 video, <u>Trump said</u>, "My view is now that we have abortion where everyone wanted it from a legal standpoint, the states will determine by vote or legislation... Many states will be different." <u>He also said</u> he would not sign a national abortion ban. In August 2024, <u>Trump</u> said he is voting no on Florida's ballot Amendment 4, which would legalize abortion throughout all nine months of pregnancy with no protections for the unborn baby.

Harris' 2020 plan included legalizing marijuana, abolishing mandatory minimum sentences, ending the death penalty and solitary confinement, stopping private prisons, getting rid of cash bail, and leveraging the president's clemency powers to reduce the number of people in federal prison. As a Senator, Harris introduced a bail reform bill with Sen. Rand Paul (R-KY) in 2017 and voted in favor of the First Step Act in 2018.

In 2018, Trump signed into law the First Step Act, which, according to a Federal Bureau of Prisons overview, "was the culmination of a bi-partisan effort to improve criminal justice outcomes, as well as to reduce the size of the federal prison population while also creating mechanisms to maintain public safety." During an Aug. 2020 White House briefing, Trump stated, "I'll appoint more tough-on-crime prosecutors. ... When you enforce the law, order follows. And we need order."

DEATH PENALTY

During her 2020 Presidential bid, <u>Harris stated</u> she would seek to end the death penalty. <u>In 2024,</u> the Democratic National Committee dropped the call for an end to the death penalty from its platform.

The <u>Trump administration presided</u> over 13 federal executions. Trump has said that he supports expanding the death penalty to include convicted drug smugglers/traffickers.

EDUCATIONAL CHOICE

No statements on Harris' position on educational choice were found. The 2024 Democratic Party Platform states, "We oppose the use of private-school vouchers, tuition tax credits, opportunity scholarships, and other schemes that divert taxpayer-funded resources away from public education. Trump's website states, "Republicans believe families should be empowered to choose the best Education for their children. We support Universal School Choice in every State in America. We will expand 529 Education Savings Accounts and support Homeschooling Families equally."

At a UN climate summit in 2023, Vice President Harris announced "a new \$3 billion pledge to the Green Climate Fund, which helps developing countries invest in resilience, clean energy, and nature-based solutions."

In 2019, the <u>Trump Administration began</u> the process of withdrawing from the Paris agreement on climate change, an international accord to reduce global green-house gas emissions.

GENDER ISSUES

In social media posts in June/July of 2023, Harris called on Congress to pass the Equality Act, which would add the new terms "sexual orientation" and "gender identity" to the definition of 'sex" in federal civil rights laws, and would exempt itself from the Religious Freedom Restoration Act of 1993. As a U.S. Senator, Harris also cosponsored the Equality Act in 2017.

In a Jan. 2023 video, <u>Trump said</u>, "I will ask Congress to pass a bill establishing that the only genders recognized by the United States government are male and female and they are assigned at birth. The bill will also make clear that Title IX prohibits men from participating in women's sports and we will protect the rights of parents from being forced to allow their minor child to assume a gender which is new and an identity without the parents' consent."

HEALTH CARE

At a March 2024 event, Harris said the Biden-Harris Administration "strengthened the Affordable Care Act so that, today, more Americans have healthcare coverage than ever before.'

In a Nov. 2023 social media post, Trump said, "Getting much better Healthcare than Obamacare for the American people will be a priority... It is not a matter of cost, it is a matter of HEALTH. America will have one of the best Healthcare Plans anywhere in the world. Right now it has one of the WORST!


