# An Ordinary Reflection-

When my brother and I were young, my parents, like most parents, taught us well. One area in particular was making sure that we always were respectful in how we spoke to people, especially adults. This meant that we were never to use any "bad words." Most of the time, we followed these rules, except sometimes when we spoke to each other! Somehow, especially whenever we were playing cards inside the house, we always got in trouble with our mouths! The importance of using "good words" and being considerate and civil to people, has stayed with me. Even as a young adult coming home from college when I would accidently let a "bad word" slip out, I could hear my stepfather say, "Watch your mouth, Michael!"

The Scriptures this Sunday aren't only concerned with "watching our mouths." In a much greater sense, they challenge us to become more aware of both our words and our actions toward one another. The reading from Sirach is a Wisdom teaching. It offers us some simple statements on "skillful living." Using images relating to the time, pottery and agriculture, the writer of Sirach wants us to realize how are conversations "disclose the bent of one's mind." Our true character is very much seen in our speech, including our faults.



The Gospel from St. Luke is the conclusion of Jesus' Sermon on the Plain. Last Sunday's reading gave us a high standard for Chrisitan living by calling us to "love your enemies." How can we possibly live up to such a standard? Is this really what Jesus is calling us to be? Jesus' teaching this Sunday advances two crucial ways for living out our discipleship. He speaks first of the need for good spiritual guides. Having a guide who is more spiritually hopeful as our teacher, helps us to not walk blindly along paths that take us away from being good, loving persons.

Jesus then exhorts us to watch out for our hypocricy: do not judge others while failing to examine our own faults. Like Sirach and our Psalm, Jesus uses farming language to speak of the importance of our lives bearing good fruit, not rotten fruit. Without a keen witness to "the wooden beam" that blocks us from our own thorniness, we hypocritically plant seeds in our hearts that too often lead to evil and injustice.

Both our readings from Sirach and Luke, speak to how speech is an action revealing the fruits of who we are. Our words take on a life of their own and lead us away from the our inner depths. This week we approach Lent. It is a time to "watch our mouths" and keep us safe, as St. Paul says, from "the sting of death." Like a scorpion, we can profoundly and permanently inject poison into our relationships and our world. Is it not time to become more firm in our commitment to Jesus'

discipleship? Is not trusting in a life of resurrection meant to lead our community to a deeper respect of all people? God invites us to "watch our mouths" and cleanse our lives this Lent. Sermon on the Mount. Last week we were presented with the reality that we bear responsibility in how the blessedness of God becomes manifest in the world. The poverty, hunger, sadness and hatred that brings woe into people's lives can to "the heavenly one" whose image we all bear. Is this how we would like to be measured? Is this how we want people to determine our being forgiven? This is the messiness of mercy. There are no limits, both in the given is poured unreservedly into the hearts of everyone.

Questions for reflection based on this Sunday's readings:

▶Sirach 27 : 4-7 Praise no one before he speaks.~ ▶1 Corinthians 15: 54-58 ~ God gives us victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

Luke 6: 39-45 ~ From the fullness of the heart the mouth speaks.

What beam in my eye will I remove this Lent?

What fruit will I produce during Lent? In other words, what two concrete things will I do to see more clearly and contribute to Jesus' mission?

#### **REGULATIONS FOR LENT 2025**

"The season of Lent is penitential in nature and during Lent penance should be not only internal and individual, but also external and social (Sacrosanctum Concilium, No. 5, 109). Pastors are obliged to avoid scheduling activities in the parishes which in any way could possibly detract from the external and social penance required by Lent."

- Diocesan Statute No. 41

**Ash Wednesday, March 5, 2025** marks the **beginning of Lent**. The following fast and abstinence regulations are observed:

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, April 18, 2025, are days of fast and abstinence. (One full meal, two partial meals that do not equal the one full meal)

Fridays during Lent are days of abstinence. (No Meat)

All Catholics who have reached their 14th birthday are to abstain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and on all Fridays during Lent. Children, though not obliged, may follow this rule also, provided their parents or guardians approve, and their health is not at risk.

All Catholics over 18 years of age to the beginning of their 60th year are bound to the obligation of fasting. Those bound by this rule may take only one full meal and two smaller meals unless dispensed or excused. Those not bound by this rule may certainly practice fasting. Children should act in obedience to their parents or guardians, and both children and adults over 60 should consider their particular health needs.

### **Lenten Opportunities**

Lent is the Church's great retreat – and MORE is expected from each of us – our homes should be different, our habits should be adjusted. Beyond the bare minimum of getting ashes and eating fish, our lives should reflect, internally and externally, the solemnity of the season – and reflection on our lives over all, our own Baptism – and how we are living up to our promises to reject Satan, sin, and live as people who truly believe in the words of the Faith we profess each week. Let us walk this road with Mary the Mother of God, in our prayer and good works. Let us walk this road with Christ, by taking up our cross daily, and following in His footsteps.

### **PRAYER**

Prayer is an essential part of Lent. In addition to our personal time of prayer at home or in the quiet of a church, you are encouraged to participate in the Masses and services in our parish and community.


