An Ordinary Reflection...

Serving Others Is Serving God

Our first reading for this Sunday begins with these words from God: It is not good for the man to be alone. The writer of the book of Genesis is not just talking about the male species. This divine statement wants us to know that none of us are very good at living our lives alone. Mahri Leonard-Fleckman, who I have quoted before, in her Bible Study book titled, Ponder. offers this beautiful reflection on this statement:

In our Genesis reading, God says, "It is not good for the man to be alone." This is important. Ultimately, it is not good, not healthy, for us to be alone, to be self-oriented, to consider ourselves overly independent. To live in deep connection to others, is not for the faint of heart – we humans are not easy when it comes to relationships! Yet to think we are independent is ultimately a lie.

Every relationship in our lives takes work - our relationship with God, our relationships with others, an even our relationship with ourselves. This week our Tuesday night group of Soup and Spirituality spent some time, after a delicious bowl of soup, considering how through each of these areas of relationship we come to understand the purpose of our lives.

Here is the starting point for any true, loving relationship with another, whether it be in marriage, in friendship, as a co-worker or in providing support for someone's pain or struggle. Every time we use our gifts, talents, resources and time to be "flesh of my flesh" with another, we enter into a different atmosphere of living. We aren't just doing a function; we are building a vocation.

Some of the Pharisees seem to have lost an openness to "building a vocation" in their lives. They seem to have become very settled, or maybe even enamored, with the function of being good, holy, religious men, and not aware that God's creative Spirit never stops producing. As they attempt to "test" Jesus and his disciples over-and-over again, their inflexibility unfortunately leads to a shutting down of the ongoing work of the Spirit in their lives.

Jesus wants us - his disciples for today, from our beginning to our end, to not fall into this trap. This is why in St. Mark's Gospel he once again brings a child into their midst. He wants to remind them of their own sacredness. He wants us to embrace and bless our relationships in the same childlike way that we seek our loved ones embracing and blessing.

All of us hopefully are given the opportunity every day to not only be good at functioning, but to also bring meaning and purpose into all of our relationships. It may be in marriage, or in the other relationships God offers us on any given day. It could be someone we happen to meet on our morning walk for the first time, or someone whose bedding we need to change every day. It could be a lifelong friend or companion. or the person who opens his or her heart and soul in confession to us. This is the service that all of us are consecrated to make happen. It is through this service to others, that we serve God.

- 2. To have the Ministry Team develop a Team for the continual implementation of the Order and the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults


<u>Goal II:</u> We will increase ministries to both youth and young adults to develop spiritual and social events, and celebrations which outreach to other youth and young adults.



"Once for all beloved children, the surest, easiest, shortest way is by the Eucharist. It is so easy to approach the holy table, and there we taste the joys of Paradise."




