THE FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT



A Lenten Reflection- Keep Hoping

Another familiar gospel, another call to "newness," and another Sunday about how to find hope in the midst of confusion, fear, and sin - these are the scriptural messages we hear once again this Sunday. Last Sunday, St. Paul referred to us as a "new creation" with a commitment to the ministry of reconciliation. This Sunday, it is the prophet Isaiah who reminds us that the Lord is "doing something new." Isaiah is specifically announcing this for those who will be returning from exile in Babylon, yet it is also an important message for us as we face the "wastelands" that often seem to surround us.



St. Paul's letter this Sunday is to the Philippians. He writes this letter in jail, not quite sure of his future. However, despite the unknown, he speaks to the people in Phillipi in a very positive way. There is a joy that fills his heart as he calls them, and us, to a deeper unity. Where does this delight come from? He has embraced a strong appreciation that Christ Jesus has taken ownership of him and he in response continues to pursue in hope what this possession brings into his daily living.

The Gospel from John leaves much to the imagination. It gives us a straight-forward description of an encounter in Jesus' life once again with the scribes and Pharisees. However, all the specific details of the story not only leaves those there at the Jerusalem Temple that morning bewildered; we, the new "jury" in this "trial" scene of the adulterous woman, probably find ourselves filled with questions.



So, what might be the message to take home into our lives? Is there any "newness" in our relationship with Jesus as we approach the devastation of Holy Week and the exultation of Easter morning? In the midst of the "jailtime" that we sometimes feel about our lives, as we pursue so many things other than the hope offered us by Jesus, can we really begin to turn our lives toward unity with Christ Jesus and one another? How believing are we of God's mercy when in John's Gospel he challenges us with two powerful statements - "Let the one among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her" and "Neither do I condemn you. Go, and from now on do not sin anymore"?

These and probably many more questions, fill our lives every day. In the business of our lives often the impact these queries have on our relationship to God get lost. Who has time to become more aware of what we need spiritually? Yet, without a new approach to where God "fits in" our lives, a deeper understanding that God truly chooses to possess every aspect of us despite the past, and an acceptance that sinful actions are in God's hands who has no stones to throw and who simply tells us to sin no more - we remain in the middle of a lot of spiritual rubbish.

It seems now is the time as we come to the end of this Lenten journey to start running towards the most important goal of our lives, if we haven't already. But we need not worry that even though it might seem there are a lot of stone holders awaiting for us to get caught in the act of sinning once again, Jesus simply writes on the ground the two words we might need to see - Keep Hoping! 
